

be committed to support that work of His Spirit at least morally, for IF YOU ARE NOT WITH HIM YOU ARE AGAINST HIM. Do you believe this? Let me say it again, **IF YOU ARE NOT WITH HIM YOU ARE AGAINST HIM!** It is the plain meaning of Jesus' words. All the verbiage about being a disciple, believing God's Word, being a son of the Reformation, an evangelical or a Pentecostal or a Catholic or this or that etc. IS JUST SO MUCH WORTHLESS HOT AIR unless you can stand with Christ in His deliverance work and say "I am with you Lord!" Amen? Hallelujah!

Being able to do this, Jesus says, qualifies YOU as a gatherer with Him and being unable to do this makes YOU a scatterer, that is, **GATHERING FOR** the Kingdom of God or **SCATTERING FROM** the Kingdom of God - a sheep or a wolf! When the Lord warned us of wolves in sheep's clothing He surely meant to warn us not to be deceived by the **APPEARANCE** of "Christians" but to observe whether or not they bore good fruit or taught destructive heresies (Matt. 7:15, 2 Peter 2:1-2).

Where do YOU stand in this matter?

(vi) Deliverance is a BREAD Ministry PRIMARILY for the People of God

This has been discussed earlier under the heading of **SANCTIFICATION** but perhaps we should dwell on this wonderful principle a moment longer. Jesus Himself said that He was the Living Bread who gives Life to the World (John 6:32-35, 47-48, 51) and for Jesus to declare that Deliverance is a Bread ministry is a high ranking indeed.

We now have two propositions which need weighing:

- (i) Jesus is the (Living) Bread**
- (ii) Deliverance is a Bread ministry**

- from which I think it is fair to say that when the Lord ministers Deliverance to a sufferer **He is GIVING HIMSELF, just as He did on the Cross, as the Bread of Life.**

Let us stop right here for a moment - doesn't that just boggle your mind?

When we add yet another scriptural proposition, that **(iii) when demons are cast out by the Spirit of God the Kingdom of God comes upon the sufferer** (Matt. 12:28), we begin to understand
